Glen Ed Pantry

For over 40 years, the Glen Ed Pantry has been serving the residents of the Edwardsville school district. And for over 40 years, St. John's has joined with many other churches and local organizations to support the pantry. Their services include providing clothing and housewares in the Second Chance store (where clients get items for free, and non-clients may shop at very affordable prices); school supplies and PE uniforms in the fall; and special "dinner" baskets for Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter. In addition, the pantry is the collection & sorting location for many area ministries, such as the Overnight Warming Locations, the SAK (serving area kids) program, and the Faith Coalition Clothing Ministry for Edwardsville students. The pantry is also a central hub where clients can connect with other agencies that can help with housing, medication costs, job training and more. Over the years, St. John's has supported the pantry in many ways:

 Our mission garden provides fresh nutritious vegetables that are greatly needed, as the pantry tries to offer healthy choices for

clients.

 We collect annually for the Thanksgiving baskets, which provide clients with all the fixings for a holiday dinner.

 The Mission Team contributes to the Pantry Utility fund, which provides assistance with utility bills.

 We provide volunteers to help with several seasonal collections, such as school supplies, Scouting for food, Shop Out Hunger, and Stamp Out Hunger. Several St. John's members have served as regular pantry volunteers, drivers and board members.

Donations and volunteers are always needed for distributing food, sorting donations, answering phones, and picking up donations that come from area restaurants, grocery chains and the St. Louis Food Bank. Pick up a "12 months of Giving" flyer or watch the Pantry Facebook page for seasonal collections. This time of year, the pantry encourages all gardeners to "Plant a row for the Pantry" to increase the supply of fresh food. Non-perishable donations may be left in the Helping Hallway at St. John's (in Fellowship Hall). Click here for more information. In the next few years, the pantry is planning to expand their space to be able to provide more services including changing rooms for the Second Chance store, office space for partner agencies, and meeting rooms for public education classes. Watch for information on an upcoming capital funds drive, and please give generously so that the pantry can continue to serve the needs of our community.

FOR DISCUSSION AND REFLECTION

- Do you have a restaurant, musician, show or something that you love, but everyone else seems to dislike it? What is one of your controversial favorites?
- In John 17:20-24, Jesus is praying for the disciples to experience unity in Him. What are some of the benefits of unity in the church? Are there any drawbacks to focusing on unity?
- A major division in the early church occurred between those who were called legalists and those who were called lawless. How can it be helpful for us to know that the early church had infighting as well?
- We're not given a clear description about how Paul, Barnabas and John Mark were reconciled, but there is evidence that they did. What do you imagine needed to happen for these Christ followers to find peace with one another again?
- Without naming names, picture someone in the church with whom you may have passionate disagreement. Is there a way to recognize the validity of the disagreement without also holding bitterness against that person? What does that look like for you?
- What is God saying to you through today's scripture?



Scripture of the Week

Acts 15:36-41

After some time Paul said to Barnabas, "Let's go back and visit each city where we previously preached the word of the Lord, to see how the new believers are doing." Barnabas agreed and wanted to take along John Mark. But Paul disagreed strongly, since John Mark had deserted them in Pamphylia and had not continued with them in their work. Their disagreement was so sharp that they separated. Barnabas took John Mark with him and sailed for Cyprus. Paul chose Silas, and as he left, the believers entrusted him to the Lord's gracious care. Then he traveled throughout Syria and Cilicia, strengthening the churches there.



April 22 Earth Day

The Methodist Church designates the Sunday closest to Earth Day as the Festival of God's Creation, celebrating God's gracious work in creating the Earth and all living things. This year, Earth Day is Monday, April 22, and Festival Sunday is Sunday, April 21.

Genesis says it was God who created the very first Earth Day: "The second day God said, 'Let there be space to divide the waters into two parts.' And it was so. God called the space Sky. 'Let the waters under the sky be gathered together into one place and let dry land appear.' ... God called the dry land Earth and the waters that were gathered together, Seas. God saw that it was good." Genesis 1:9-10, New Revised Standard Version.

On April 22, 1970, the United States began celebrating Earth Day annually, creating a movement that now motivates people around the world to use the day to consider the planet, demonstrate their love for it and enact ways to protect it. Organizers anticipate more than one billion people around the globe will take part in events this year engaging in environmental issues.

This Earth Week, we encourage you to find ways to care for our planet. These may include:

- Meatless Monday- Eat less meat or choose vegetarian options for meals
- Transit Tuesday- Walk, bike or ride the bus to work, school or church activities
- Waste Wednesday- Save kitchen scraps for your own or St. John's Mission Garden compost
- Thirsty Thursday- Monitor water usage by collecting rainwater or shortening shower time
- Forest Friday- Plant a tree or donate to plant a tree on our property
- Sustainable Saturday- Support community efforts to end plastic pollution by joining a litter cleanup crew


